Some useful Butterfly and Moth books and apps:

Philip's Guide to Butterflies of Britain and Ireland, Jeremy Thomas

Detailed descriptions of all the butterflies that are likely to be seen in the UK. Includes lifecycles, food plants and distribution. Used copies of the 2007 edition are available fairly cheaply.

British Moths: A Photographic Guide, Chris Manley

This has photos of all the macro moths and many of the micros. (The first edition of the book also had butterflies and a good selection of caterpillars but is out of print – look for used copies.)

The next two books are field guides and valuable for anyone really interested in moths.

Field Guide to the Moths of Great Britain and Ireland, Paul Waring and Martin Townsend

Lots of information about the macro moths, excellent for identification. There is also a concise edition.

Field Guide to the Micro Moths of Great Britain and Ireland, Phil Sterling and Mark Parsons

Lots of information about the micro moths, excellent for identification.

Independent booksellers such as http://www.pemberleybooks.com/ and http://www.pemberleybooks.com/ and http://www.atroposbooks.co.uk/ often give a better price than Amazon for nature books so it's worth shopping around.
